Hi Time,

I have made some research and found some tools to accomplish doc generation. It satisfies yours requirements which are, cross-platform, open-source and possibility to automatically generate class diagrams.

To achieve the automatic doc generation the Doxygen and the Graphviz tools are needed. With appropriate configuration it can take source files (c/c++, java and others) as an input and then it produces documentation in HTML or Tex formats as an output. As long as I don't have an access to your automatic build system (at least I am not aware of it), I can only provide a brief tutorial how to set those tools up properly. Brief tutorial how to use Doxygen and graphviz:

First, graphviz and Doxygen need to be installed and need to be accessible from console.

After installation, choose directory, where configuration file for Doxygen will be stored. In that directory, call 'doxygen -g'. It will generate configuration file named 'Doxyfile'. By editing it, you can set up your specific demands on doc generation.

Recommended changes are:

```
EXTRACT_ALL      = YES
HAVE_DOT         = YES (uses Graphviz for rendering class diagrams)
UML_LOOK         = YES
INPUT            = 'here you put the path to the directory with source files'
OUTPUT_DIRECTORY = 'here you put the path to the directory where the doc will be saved'
RECURSIVE        = YES/NO - to travers directory tree recursively or not
GENERATE_LATEX   = YES/NO
GENERATE_HTML    = YES/NO
```

You can make several config files for Doxygen and each of them points to a different source code folder with different settings.

After configuration, you can let your automatic build system to call 'doxygen XYZ' (XYZ is a path to the configuration file) on each configuration files and let the build system to post a link to the generated index.html (in case you choose HTML as an output format) to the wiki. Each call of 'doxygen XYZ' generates one doc.

I hope that this will help to enhance the development of the Filezilla and help other developers to understand how the Filezilla is built with less effort.

Please, let me know about you opinion on this proposal.
